Happy New Year and a Blessed Epiphany

Epiphany, also known as the "Theophany," is generally celebrated on January 6th. At St. Stephen's, we chose to celebrate it on January 2nd. If you search for the word, *Epiphany* in the glossary definitions as found in *An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church*, *A User-*



Friendly Reference for Episcopalians, (Church Publishing Incorporated, New York, NY, Don S. Armentrout and Robert Boak Slocum, editors), you will find the following:

"The manifestation of Christ to the peoples of the earth. The winter solstice was kept on Jan. 6 at some places during the first centuries of the Christian Era. In opposition to pagan festivals, Christians chose this day to celebrate the various manifestations, or "epiphanies," of Jesus' divinity. These showings of his divinity included his birth, the coming of the Magi, his baptism, and the Wedding at Cana where he miraculously changed water into wine. The day was called "The Feast of Lights." Celebration of the Son of God replaced celebration of the sun. Baptisms were done, and a season of preparation was instituted. It was later called Advent.

The solstice was kept on Dec. 25 by the fourth century. Jesus' birth was celebrated on this day in both eastern and western churches. The western church commemorated the coming of the Magi on Jan. 6. The eastern church continued to celebrate the Baptism of our Lord and the Wedding at Cana on Jan. 6. In the east the day was called "Theophany" (manifestation of God)."

So it is that we begin a new year as a season of light – the light of Christ, piercing the hardness of heart and the places in the world where there is no light of hope or joy.

It is this ever-pure and holy light of Christ that pierces through our fatigue, our restlessness, our agitated spirits fighting to make right out of wrong, justice out of injustice and equality out of inequality. The light of Christ leads us in the true direction, the direction that Jesus wants us to go, where there might be the need for change of heart and mind. The way of Jesus might involve small sacrifices to be made along the way, and most definitely, the way of Jesus will always require love of self and others.

Stop and reflect on what we have had to endure. We can only hope for a better year, a year of light and joy. A year where our faith is strengthened to be a witness to that light of the Christ child.

THE VESTRY

Are you called to leadership? Lay leadership in the Episcopal Church is a tradition that extends back to when Anglican parishes reorganized into the Episcopal Church after the American Revolution. Lay leaders play important roles in lives of our parish, deanery, diocese, and the wider Episcopal Church.

Here at St. Stephen's, our Nominating Committee is seeking individuals who are interested in serving in leadership positions in various capacities. Elections will take place at our Annual Meeting on Sunday, February 27, 2022, at Noon.

The Vestry

This board is the legal entity of the parish. Thirteen parishioners and The Reverend Gregory Perez form the Vestry. It oversees parish finances and develops budgets as well as supports the clergy in conducting our common ministry together. The Vestry meets monthly and conducts the work of the parish between Annual Meetings. All vestry persons must be members of the parish aged 16 years or older, maintain regular public worship and support the parish financially. Long standing Vestry tradition and policy is that all vestry members support the parish financially through their pledge and that no vestry members from the same household or family serve concurrently. The Vestry is comprised of four officers who conduct the work of vestry between monthly meetings. As required by state law, all officers of the vestry must be 18 years or older.

Senior Warden and Junior Warden

The Senior and Junior Wardens manage and care for the parish's property, sign legal documents and contracts, and most importantly, support the clergy in identifying and conducting our common ministries for the parish. Wardens ensure that public worship takes place in the absence of the parish priest. In addition to the previously mentioned requirements, candidates for Warden must be a Confirmed or Received communicant of the Episcopal Church. Terms are 1 year in length, for a maximum of three successive terms. After completing three successive terms, the Junior Warden is eligible to be a candidate for the Senior Warden position.

Clerk

The clerk maintains parish membership rolls, records all proceedings of Vestry and Annual Meetings, and certifies documents when required. Terms are 1 year in length, for a maximum of six successive terms.

Treasurer

The treasurer maintains the financial records for the parish and arranges for their regular review at Vestry meetings. In compliance with Diocesan regulations, the treasurer arranges for the audit all financial records and accounts annually. Terms are 1 year in length for a maximum of six successive terms.

Vestry Members

There are nine seats on the Vestry, all serving one three-year term. Three seats (or more in case of a vacancy) are up for election at each annual meeting. Vestry members support the work of the parish in its ministry and are active participants in the life of the parish.

The Deanery Assembly

The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts is divided into twelve regions or deaneries. St. Stephen's is a member parish of the North Shore Deanery, which extends from Lynn to Ipswich and eastward to Cape Ann. Delegates from the parishes within the deanery gather quarterly for fellowship, trainings/workshops on Diocesan initiatives and ministries, vote on the distribution of grant monies to parishes as allocated to the deanery through our diocese. Delegates also elect two (one lay and one clergy) representatives to serve on Diocesan Council. In addition to the dissemination of essential information and resources, delegates from deanery parishes gather for fellowship, building closer relationships with our sister parishes across the North Shore and Cape Ann. St. Stephen's has six lay votes at the Deanery assembly. Four members serve as Deanery Delegates at-large, and two members serve both at the Deanery level but also represent St. Stephen's at Diocesan Convention. Terms are 1 year in length; no term limits.

Diocesan Convention

All parishes in the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts get two lay votes at Diocesan Convention and may vote on motions, amendments, and elections for diocesan positions and for deputies to General Convention (the triennial meeting of the Episcopal Church). When an election for a bishop is called, parish delegates get to cast their votes. There are seats for two delegates and up to two alternates (substitutes). The parish pays for convention expenses for voting delegates. Convention delegates must also be willing to be voting members at the Deanery assembly. Terms are 1 year in length; no term limits.

FOOD PANTRY

Last month we reported that the Food Pantry has received grants of \$5,000 from the Eastern Bank Charitable Foundation, and \$6,700 from Beth Israel Senior Citizens Housing, Inc. (BISCHI) specifically for replacement tables, shelving and fridge. Michael Celona from the UU Church of Greater Lynn submitted a grant for our food pantry from the UU Church, and we received that grant check in the amount of \$9,000. In addition to these grants, St. Stephen's Food Pantry was the recipient of a \$1,000 check from the students at Lynn Vocational Technical Institute! What a gift from local teens doing great work! With these generous grants and donations, and with the donations we have received from many of our parishioners, the food pantry can afford the monthly charges for trucking and delivery.

Pre-pandemic the food pantry was giving out about 50 bags of food per week. The new normal is an average of 160 bags of food per week!! Our small space is at capacity, and during the holidays it was well over capacity to serve this many people. This past year we have been receiving about 10,000 pounds of food per month from the Greater Boston Food Bank. We will begin receiving two food deliveries of about 9,000 pounds of food in January for a total of 18,000 pounds of food per month. We will receive food deliveries every second and fourth Friday of the month now.

Our volunteers are a dedicated bunch of people from St. Stephen's, the UU Church, and from the local community, but they need help. Especially during the food delivery times. If you are able-bodied and able to carry boxes up to 40 pounds, please consider volunteering on the mornings of food delivery. There are many other places where people can volunteer to help.
