Feast and Fast Feed the Soul

"Between endings and beginnings,/ there is a blank time/ when nothing is supposed to happen./ It's frustrating, fearful,/ but it's supposed to be that way./ Like a tree in winter,/

on the outside/ there is nothing going on, but/ inside is hidden growth./ This growth explodes in spring./ Spring can't happen/ without the blank time./ We need winter/ and so it is forced upon us."

Recently, someone sent me this poem by Peter McDonald. As snow piles up, I am captivated by the notion that "we need winter and so it is forced upon us." The words resonate because I would never choose the frozen, bleak, lifelessness of winter but I know spring and summer abundance depend on this time of incubation. Just yesterday, Debbie Potter reminded us that our summer gardens would be glad for this week's snow.

I'm clear that our spirits also require times of introspection and reflection. In the Episcopal Church, our liturgical calendar knows that we need seasons of fast as well as feast. Having celebrated Christmas joyfully with friends and family, and welcomed the Epiphany with Rev. Sarah's ordination and Bishop Alan's first Episcopal visit to St. Stephen's, we are doing a fine job with our seasons of feasting. Clearly, on February 1, we all need to be in church to pray for the Patriots and prepare for our Superbowl parties!

On February 8, when we gather for our Annual Meeting and Potluck, the feasting will continue as we enjoy good food, give thanks for the abundant ministries of our parish, and celebrate leaders who are stepping down as well as those who are stepping in. Having read countless drafts of our Annual Report over the last week as it moves toward completion, I am awed by the over-flowing blessings that St. Stephen's both is and receives.

Of course, February also brings us the queen of parties—Mardi Gras! While we don't even try to rival New Orleans or the Caribbean, we do maintain the tradition of closing out Epiphany on Shrove Tuesday with a family friendly feast of Pancakes and Gumbo as we reflect both our English/Canadian Maritime and Caribbean heritage. Since Shrove Tuesday falls during School Vacation Week this year, the Youth Ministries Team invites Middle and High Schoolers to join Neil O'Donnell in the kitchen at 1:00 to make Gumbo. At 3:00, Rev. Sarah will join the fun with Mardi Gras crafts and more cooking. Eating and games will begin at 5:30 with our liturgy for burning the palms happening in the parking lot at 7:30.

On Ash Wednesday, as we come to church to receive ashes on our foreheads as signs of our humanity and mortality, we will be invited to "the observance of a holy Lent, by self examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word." Join us for worship at 7:30am, noon, or 7:00pm and every Lenten Sunday. Lent is our season of introspection as we examine our lives and reflect on whether we are right with God and our neighbor. Do our lives truly reflect God's glory?

Just as few of us would choose winter, few of us would choose Lent "so it is forced upon us." Our spirits require both feast and fast. Let God grow quietly in you this Lent so that you are ready for the abundance of spring and Easter when they come in April.



Dear Friends,

As I look ahead to the month of February I'm once again amazed by just how much stuff St. Stephen's fits into four weeks. Of course it's all good stuff, even amazing stuff: Lenten Bible Study, mid-week Healing Services, youth retreat, Food Pantry, ECCO dinners and many more. That's what I love about this community—there's something for everyone and if we don't have we'll help you create it!

This has been on my mind as I reflect on Bishop Gates' sermon from his visit in January. As he spoke about Jesus' baptism he asked us again and again, "What are you doing here?" What are you doing as a Christian? What are you doing as a member of St. Stephen's?

As I mentioned above there are a lot of options. In listening to God we find the possibility of new options as well. One that I'm particularly excited about is a growing team that is committed to creating space for intentional conversations about race and privilege. The team was formed out of a shared realization that God didn't intend the world to become what it is now. God did not create the world to be divided in terms of race, class, age, etc... So as people of God, how do we love and serve across those divisions? Working with the Leadership Development Initiative trainers we will use the tools of community organizing to engage this topic in conversation, prayer, and action. But in order to fully do this work we need all voices and all hearts. This is not for just black people or just white people—it's for all of us because we are all part of God's creation.

In the next few weeks we will enter the season of Lent. It's a season to put aside sweets and temptations but it's also a season to do something new, to step outside of your comfort zone for 40 days.

A View from the Pew

It is that time of year again when St. Stephen's gears up for its Annual Meeting. The treasurer's office is busy making sure the end-of-the year budget and the next fiscal year's budget is all set for printing. Leaders of various ministries and groups are writing their reports to be compiled in the Annual Report. Vestry members whose terms are expiring are now part of the Nominating Committee and are soliciting others to offer themselves up in a leadership role.

Annual Meeting....it's a time of planning ahead and reflecting on the past year. It's about celebrating all the hard work that has been done and taking pause to remember where we fell short. It's a bitter-sweet time where we rejoice with those who have been added to our rolls in Baptism and grieve those who have died over the last year. It's about electing our lay leadership who will oversee our Annual budget, our physical property, will lead us through our mission statement and will represent St. Stephen's at the Deanery and Diocesan levels. It's a time to see how St. Stephen's grew the talents you entrusted to the Vestry. It's about life at St. Stephen's!!

The Parish By-laws are very clear as to whom can vote and run for office. Any person sixteen years of age or older, who contributes financially and worships regularly at St. Stephen's is eligible to vote and run for Vestry, Deanery and Delegates to Diocesan Convention. Due to the laws of the Commonwealth, the minimum age for the positions of Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Clerk and Treasurer is eighteen. However, all are welcome to attend the meeting to hear about the life and vitality of the parish...Sunday, February 8, 2015 in the Dining Room after the 10am service.

For me, I decided not to run for a third successive term as the Senior Warden. I feel that it is more ideal, whenever possible, to have staggered warden terms. This allows for at least one warden to have "institutional knowledge" of programs, decisions, contracts, etc. providing for a smooth transition. When two wardens start together and end together, the transition process can be a little more difficult for the new wardens. The other piece that helped form my decision not to seek another term was that the major projects were either now done or established. The Apse Wall Restoration Project and the grant work with the Massachusetts Historical Society are now closed. The year long process working with the Vestry to write a new Mission Statement and redefine our mission goals is now complete.

It has been an honor to be able to serve on the Vestry at St. Stephen's. The talent that abides in each person on the Vestry is wide and varied. Some are great with numbers, some with words, some are visionaries and some are practical. We work together...we share a common love for our parish...making each meeting both important and meaningful. I am truly grateful to all of you who have supported me in this role; I could not have done it without all of your help.

STEWARDS OF RESOURCES

VESTRY SUMMARY: JANUARY 11. The Vestry reviewed end-of-year financials, and discussed and approved the proposed 2015 budget. The Vestry is mindful that our near-balanced 2015 budget depends on our Diocesan assessment abatement given in gratitude for our hosting the 2014 Diocesan Convention. Maintaining the staff and ministries we have will require us finding at least \$30,000 in additional income for 2016. In addition to discussing recruiting candidates for Vestry, Deanery, and Diocesan Convention, we offered words of gratitude for leadership of out-going Vestry members: Senior Warden Chris Trahan, Irene Axelrod, Joanne Droppers, Jeff McAvoy, and Hazel Johnson who resigned effective at the Annual Meeting due to her serving as Church School Coordinator for St. Paul's, Brookline.

FROM THE TREASURER'S OFFICE. January is a very busy month for the Treasurer's Office as final financials for 2014 needed to be prepared as well as a budget for 2015. The good news is that the Vestry approved a near-balanced budget and it as well as all the 2014 financials are included in the Annual Report. 2014 donation statements have been prepared and will be mailed by early February. CONTEMPORARY WORSHIP OFF TO A GREAT START IN THE NEW YEAR! On Sunday, January 18th, people filled Lawrence Hall to sing upbeat worship songs, pray, and listen to Joe Brown III as he talked about his experience as a black man in Lynn. While the topic of his message was inspired by it being MLK Day weekend, Joe didn't focus on issues of race per se. Instead, he shared his story of growing up in a loving family, a welcoming church, and a community where he built friendships with people of different colors and cultures. He said that folks have asked him at times, "Is St. Stephen's a white church or a black church?," and his response has always been that it's both and more. All of us, after all, are made equally in God's image, as the night's Scripture reading from Genesis reminded everyone. Following the message, folks split up into small group to reflect on how Joe's words spoke to them, challenged them, and invited them to take action. The evening ended with more music, open prayer time, and a litany of lament and praise. Food and fellowship followed for those who didn't rush home to watch the Patriots beat Indy. Join us on Sunday, February 15 at 6:30 as we praise God in song, scripture, prayer, conversation, and community.
