Light in the Darkness

The week before Christmas my sons and I whisked John away for an early celebration of his 70th birthday. While the timing of the trip caused me (before and since) to question my sanity, it was the only week before June that everyone could make work. As we planned the adventure, we told John he was going to Milwaukee. In truth, we organized for ourselves a week in Puerto Rico.

We spent five nights on the island of Vieques basking in the light. Certainly, we enjoyed plentiful sunshine as we sat on the terrace of our house, snoozed on sandy beaches, and snorkeled off rocky piers. Given the 30-second downpours that characterize the Puerto Rican "rainy season," the tropics treated us to single and double rainbows that arced across the sky. At night, in the words of the Tallis Canon, "the moon took up the wondrous tale," with the full moon lighting our way as we walked into Isabel Segundo for dinner.

The most amazing light show the island offered was the bioluminescence of Mosquito Bay. As veterans of The Life of Pi, Gardy and Tiffanie knew all about glow-in-the-dark-water having modeled the special effects of the swimming fish and breaching whale of Pi on videos from this bright bay. With clouds drifting across the moon to provide steady darkness, our kayak paddles and hands dipped into the water and came alive with the light of millions of tiny plankton. Specks of bright light glowed from our fingertips and swimming fish illuminated their own paths through the water.

But, of course, the truly transforming light was the light of love. The sunshine, moon beams, rainbows, and magical beads of light that made a lasting impression were the lights of love-- lights that get taken for granted so often in the busy-ness of life. As we celebrated John, we all remembered the gift and grace of lives woven together by love.

During Christmas and Epiphany seasons, we open ourselves to Jesus who is the light of the world; who is love incarnate. In the midst of the stress, sorrow, and struggles of our lives, we sometimes forget God's gift of light and love. We can ignore God's promise of bringing light to the darkness; we can miss the bright star that leads us to Jesus; we can close our ears and eyes to the bright light from heaven that claims us as beloved children of God; and we can be blind to the transforming light of God who makes all things new. But these are the signs and symbols of the season.

And so as we begin a new calendar year in the midst of this season of light, resolve to look for the light, and to let God's holy light shine in and through each one of us. If we Christians do not consciously and intentionally bask in God's light and love and share it with one another and our community, there is little hope for our world.

Let the light shine in fellowship and formation activities; let the light shine through community service and mentoring our young people; let the light shine by offering God's love to someone who is lonely or lost; let the light shine as we sing, pray, and come to the Lord's Table every Sunday. This little light of mine, I'm going to let it shine!

LEADERSHIP REFLECTIONS: A VIEW BEYOND THE PEWS

By the time you receive this newsletter, all the Christmas celebrations will be done. Christmas trees will be out on the curbs and decorations will be packed up in boxes. But, the vestry has been busy working on our mission goals that will help shape parish life for the next five to ten years. As you remember, this process started back in Lent, when vestry members had one-to-one conversations with many of you about what you loved about St. Stephen's, what was most important to you at St. Stephen's and in what ways could St. Stephen's be better. From these conversations, we compiled information and started talking about where we have been and what have we done over the last nine years. Then, over the summer, the vestry spent two days at the Society of St. John the Evangelist with the brothers and our diocesan business consultant, Sam Thayer. We worked over everything we have heard and prayed where the Lord was calling us to go. From that information, we wrote a new mission statement. During the fall months, the vestry has been working on goals that will carry out the new mission statement.

So this now brings us back to you. We want you to hear what the vestry has developed so far. This is your opportunity to add to the draft goals or question what the vestry has in there. The vestry invites you to share your thoughts with us on Sunday, January 12, 2014, after the ten o'clock service. The vestry will then use your input as we develop the final draft of our mission goals, which will be "unveiled" at the Annual Meeting on February 9, 2014.

A lot of time and effort has gone into this process and I commend everyone on the vestry for their hours of dedicated work on this. Our mission statement and mission goals are very important to the life of St. Stephen's; they shape the programs and various activities that we do, which directly affect the budget and how we allocate our resources.

As we talk about leadership, please keep in mind that at the Annual Meeting, in addition to the formal presentation of our new mission statement and goals, the budget will be presented as voted by the vestry and we will be electing our parish leadership: vestry officers (Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Treasurer, Clerk, all one-year terms), and three vestry members (three-year terms), five delegates to the North Shore Deanery and two delegates and two alternate delegates to Diocesan Convention. In 2014, there will be two conventions, a special one, called by the Standing Committee of the Diocese, in April, to elect our next Diocesan Bishop and the annual one in November. Anyone who is sixteen or older, maintains regular attendance at St. Stephen's and contributes financially to St. Stephen's is eligible to vote and hold office. Due to the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Canons of the church, all officers have to be eighteen or older and have been Confirmed or Received into the Episcopal Church.

If you feel that you want to step into a leadership role within our parish, deanery or diocese, please speak with a member of the Nominating Committee: Steve Switzer, Keyana Brown, Sally Gosselin or Patrick LaFortune. I know many of you out there would make great leaders. Please consider running for a position. A little extra donated time will do a lot for your parish community.

BISHOP SHAW SCHEDULED TO VISIT ST. STEPHEN'S FEBRUARY 2, 2014. Having served as our Diocesan Bishop for two decades, Bishop Tom Shaw will retire when we consecrate our new bishop on September 13. We will elect our new bishop in a Special Diocesan Convention on April 5. On February 2, Bishop Shaw will be with us at St. Stephen's as he visits parishes that have been strongly connected with his ministry as Bishop of Massachusetts. Mark your calendars now so that you will be with us as we gather to give thanks.

ANNUAL MEETING FEBRUARY 9, 2014 AT NOON. Thanks to a by-law change voted at the Annual Meeting in 2012, our Annual Meeting has moved to February. While the shift gives everyone a bit more time to complete reports after Christmas, please turn in annual reports as soon as possible. And mark your calendars now for the Annual Meeting and Potluck on Sunday, February 9 at noon. Episcopal governance requires the participation of the members.

ARE YOU CALLED TO SERVE? The Nominating Committee of Keyana Brown, Patrick Lafortune, and Steve Switzer needs your help identifying candidates for leadership in the parish, deanery and diocese. Nomination forms and position descriptions are available in the Galahad Area. This year we will elect 4 Vestry members, 4 Vestry officers (Senior and Junior Wardens, clerk and Treasurer), Diocesan Convention delegates (2 delegates and 2 alternates), and five Deanery representatives (2 elected at large, plus 2 Convention delegates and 1 Warden). We depend on people offering their gifts in service to God and this church. Please prayerfully consider whether you might be called to serve. While nominations can be made from the floor, democracy works better if people know the candidates in advance of the election. Nomination papers are due by Sunday, January 26, 2014.

ANNUAL REPORTS DUE JANUARY 17. All ministry leaders and event coordinators are reminded that your annual reports are due by Friday, January 17, 2014. Please email your concise, informative report to the office (ststephens@ststephenslynn.org) by the 17th. Our hope is to have copies of the Annual Report available by Sunday, February 2, 2014 so that you can be informed participants on the 9th.

DECEMBER VESTRY SUMMARY. In December the Vestry focused on reviewing the income side of the 2013 draft budget. The Vestry continued discussion of mission goals, discussed the Vestry's role in recruiting new Vestry members, and received updates from the Stewardship Ministry Team and Building Restoration Team.

MISSION PRIORITIES CONVERSATION JANUARY 12. The Vestry devoted significant time in 2013 to re-working our mission statement and identifying mission priorities for the next 5 years. On January 19, the Vestry will vote the new mission priorities and present them at the Annual Meeting on February 9. While setting priorities is the work of the Vestry, your leaders hope to integrate your thoughts into their final draft. Please join the Vestry on Sunday, January 12 at noon for a conversation about mission priorities. Lunch and childcare will be provided.
