#### From the Interim Priest

A few years ago I took up rowing. I was driving past the UMass-Lowell Boathouse on the Merrimack River and saw a banner inviting all to "Learn to Row" so I signed up. It was perfect for me; I was working at the homeless shelter in Lowell and needed to do something completely different. I was in an eight person boat with a coxswain. Each rower has one oar, called Sweep rowing. It was great. I had my oar and was told exactly what to do. I learned to be in sync with everyone else in the boat. Eyes forward, focusing on the back of the head of the person in front of me, one stroke after another. When the cox said faster, we rowed faster, when she said row harder we rowed harder. Only when she said take a break, could we take a break. I enjoyed being part of a team with someone else in charge.

Since coming to St. Stephen's I have not been able to participate in the evening Sweep program in Lowell. An alternative to Sweeping is called Sculling, where the rower has two oars and is usually rowing alone. I have been able to do this and found that while sculling is similar to sweeping, it feels different. The boat is smaller, narrower, and does not have those big oars to keep it stable. It is much easier to tip over while sculling. However, except for the hands, the basic mechanics of the stroke is the same. The change is that I am solely responsible for the balance, or set, of the boat. I also, have to pay attention to where I am going since there is no cox to guide me. I get to determine the pace and strength of each stroke and can take a break whenever I want.

It has occurred to me that St. Stephen's has also moved from Sweep rowing to Sculling. You no longer have someone who is steering the boat and telling you when to row harder and when to rest. St. Stephen's is largely on its own, having to look around, having to keep the "boat" set and determine how hard to push. What is remarkable to me is how much you, the members of St. Stephen's, are staying your seats and driving this ship forward. It is different than when you had a Rector, but the commitment and vision continues.

It has been a great privilege for me to be on the water with you. We may be mid-steam but God has provided all that we need to keep on rowing.

It has been quite a busy spring around the church as we wind down from the regular program year and gear up for summer youth programs. St. Stephen's is blessed to have a crew of dedicated volunteers who give of their time and talent to make so many things happen around the church. Here are but a few glimpses of activities that have happened this spring. Other activities will also be highlighted elsewhere in this newsletter. Our Sunday School finished up the program year on Sunday, June  $10^{\rm th}$ . We gave out numerous scholarships, both from endowed funds and from gifts of parishioners. It was a great time to celebrate our parishioners who are continuing their education in a post secondary setting as well as a time to thank and remember past and present parishioners for their commitment to helping others further their education.

Members of our KIC Advisory Board have been busy applying for grant funding for KIC summer camp as well as getting things ready for the program to "kick" off in just a few weeks. St. Stephen's is blessed to have been awarded thousands of dollars in grants that will fund KIC again this summer. What an awesome testament to the importance of this program serving the needs of the people in our neighborhoods!

The Summer Learning Program is also preparing for the summer. Grant funding, from the diocese and private sources, is being received in order to run this program again this year. Summer Learning will run tandem to KIC Summer Camp for elementary age children to get extra tutoring in reading and math to continue to enrich their academic skills so that they may not fall behind during summer vacation.

The Big Money Raffle Committee kicked off the summer fundraising season on Sunday, June 10<sup>th</sup>. The Big Money raffle drawing will be held this year on July 29<sup>th</sup> in the dining room at St. Stephen's, due to the Porthole Restaurant closing its doors. Remember to get your tickets early as this fundraiser continues to get more popular each year. Last year, tickets were sold out before the event was held.

And while all this has been happening, members of the Vestry and Search Committee held a joint retreat with our diocesan consultant to discuss the search process for a new rector. Members of the Search Committee are busy planning out the next steps in order to prepare a parish profile that we may post for prospective applicants. Please be willing to participate in activities that will help the Search Committee gather important information for this process.

Last, the repairs to the Anderson Wing, due to the frozen pipe burst in January, are nearly complete. The last remaining items are cosmetic finishing touches and the replacement of the control panel on the boiler. Having most of the affected rooms off limits during the repairs has been a big inconvenience this past winter and spring however, it did bring beneficial improvements to our space.

#### Farewell from Our Life Together Fellow

I didn't know Reverend Jane was leaving when I was offered the position to work at St. Stephen's. When I accepted, I imagined my job would mostly consist of being mentored by Reverend Jane and Reverend Sarah, and just doing exactly what concrete tasks they laid out for me. As you all know, that is so far from the reality of my year here, where at times, all of us in the office had to scramble to get even the smallest task done on time. This period of transition has been so different than we all imagined and that is challenging.

But this time I got to share with you all, has been the largest blessing. So many woman have adopted me as their daughter and I have had friendship extended to me by so many.

During transitions, it is incredibly easy to lose to track of our values and what is important to us. Anxiety and fear begin to creep in. What if KIC never reopens? What if we don't have enough kids in church school? I know I have felt scared plenty of times this year. However, in times of stress, I remember the things that brought me to call this place home before I even started working here: the openness to difference, the kids running up and down the aisles, the holy chaos, the 15 minute peace, the strong woman, the plethora of alleluias, the deep & real commitment to our community, the quirkyness, and more. Before starting to come here in my junior year of college, I was used to Evangelical churches where, to me, there was a lack of theological and social commitments and a heavy emphasis on the performative aspects of the service. And to me, St. Stephens is the opposite of that in the most holy, beautiful way, and it is where I found my church home. I hope we all can remember our sense of belong and love for this place in the scary moments of transition we will continue to have.

Not having a Life Together Fellow next year could feel really alarming. But I am not nervous because I know of all the people that stepped up to get things done this year. The Christmas pageant, CPPK, Elf Gifts, MLK Day, Signature Collecting with ECCO, Youth Sundays, The Soul Celebration, Lynn Youth Pride, Church School, and more, would not have been possible if we all didn't work together in the ways we have. No matter what the staff looks like over the next couple years and how the programs change, I know that you all will remain committed to this place being welcoming for all.

I have learned a lot about what it means to be a "St. Stephens Episcopalian" this year. And I know that I am one. St. Stephens is the only Episcopal Church I know and part of me is pretty nervous to see what other Episcopal churches are like. But, as I start divinity school at Boston University in the fall, I will not forget the lessons of being a "St. Stephens Episcopalian." I will prioritize relationships. I will take my theology into the streets. I will challenge my internalized white norms for work. I will love Jesus.

So thank you all so much for helping me grow and teaching me this year. But also know that my "good-bye" is also a "see-you-later," because Boston is not that far, and I will never pass up an invitation to catch up over at Brother's Deli!

#### FROM THE TREASURER'S OFFICE:

The 2017 Parish Audit has been completed and accepted by the Diocese. The Parish has been working for the last year to overhaul our Chart of Accounts so that we could meet new diocesan audit guidelines. The work that has been done by the Treasurer with the help of diocesan financial consultant, Terry Robinson, has brought our financial reporting and tracking up to date. In addition to ensuring that we meet diocesan guidelines, it also means clearer and more detailed reports for the Vestry. Also, tracking our diverse income streams, designated and restricted funds and endowment is now much simpler and can all be managed through Quick Books. So, compiling information for the Annual Report will also be easier for the Treasurer's Office. As we enter the search process for a new permanent Rector, one detail that many are not aware of is that the Parish will go through a financial review by the Diocese. The good news is that much of the work that was undertaken to revise of Chart of Accounts has given us a head start, and that Terry Robinson will carry forward as our Financial Consultant for the review.

As summer is upon us, please use your Realm log in to make sure your pledge is up to date if you plan to wander! If you need help to set up a Realm profile and log in, please speak with Carolyn Hoy or Heather Collis Puro. Realm is a great way for the Parish and Treasurer's Office to track personal and giving information.


Pledge statements will go out in July. Those who have Realm profiles can log in any time to check their balance!




#### SONIA HODGE'S ORDINATION TO THE DEACONATE, SATURDAY JUNE 2, 10:30AM.
