Let Christ Dwell in You Richly

During Eastertide, our Sunday readings dive into the Acts of the Apostles. We hear stirring stories of thousands coming to faith and being baptized in a single day. We listen to harrowing tales of arrests, persecutions and deaths of those faithful to Jesus including our patron saint Stephen. And Luke reports, "*Those who had been baptized devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.*" Acts 2.42-47

Do you ever wonder what it would have been like to be a Christian in those days when following Jesus required that we give up everything and put our lives on the line? It was risky to be a Christian. Yet, the words used to describe the earliest followers of Jesus are joyful, glad, generous... not fearful, burdened, or struggling. Their love of the Lord shaped who they were and how they lived. Sometimes I long for the excitement of faith and passionate commitment of those people giving their lives fully and completely to Christ.

And yet, the Bible also gives us stories of struggle in the early church. Obviously, we have the disciples' betrayal, denial, and abandonment at the time of Jesus' arrest and crucifixion. And, Acts lets us know of the contest for leadership of the church between Peter and Paul. Further, Paul's letters give us windows into communities of faith that were confused, competitive, and unclear about how they were to live until Christ's coming again. While Jesus challenges us to put God at the center of who we are and all we do, the followers of Jesus have always struggled with what it means to live faithfully.

On Easter and Pentecost, we welcome people into the Body of Christ through baptism. On May 3, we host Confirmation with seven from St. Stephen's claiming their membership in the Episcopal Church. And, during May we prepare children for First Communion, which we will celebrate on Sunday, June 1st. Through our sacraments, we weave new members into the community of the church and commit ourselves to being their companions on the way.

Our church calendar overflows with opportunities to continue in "*the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in the prayers,*" *to care for all "as any have need,*" and to be good stewards of the physical, financial, and human resources entrusted to us. All of it matters and all can draw us closer to one another and to God. But the simple challenge of the Gospel is to put Christ at the center of who we are and what we do. This Eastertide consider the programs and possibilities of the church, and let Christ dwell in you richly.



Building Projects Continue

We are blessed to have such a beautiful large building that enables us to gather together for worship and to carry out the work that the Gospels tell us to do. However, projects continue to unfold one after another. Between keeping up with an old building, making necessary repairs and staying current with building code regulations require some constant monitoring. So here is but a glimpse of what has been happening around our physical plant.

Many noticed that during the Nor'easter storm of March 29-30th, the Apse wall, over the communion rail, leaked. Granted it was but a fraction of what would have come in pre-restoration work with a nearly three inches of rainfall, but the fact remains, it still leaked. The architect and contractors were immediately called to visit the site and to assess the cause. From the ground, it appeared that all contracted work was still buttoned up tight. They then called in a lift, which was parked in the parking lot on Easter Day, and looked over all areas that were repaired. Again, everything is intact...no loose slates, missing flashing or broken mortar joints. It appears that the water is entering the cupola over the Apse through the ventilator. To be sure of this, scaffolding will be assembled in the nave of the church in order to gain access inside the cupola to see what may be done to ameliorate this problem.

New steel doors were recently installed on the lower level of the building. The basement entry, the food pantry entry and the kitchen entry all have new steel doors and a fresh coat of "Episcopal Red" paint. They will greatly improve security, climate control and be a deterrent to rodents looking for shelter (and food). In addition, you may have noticed several new replacement windows in the Sunday School wing. Back in September, through the generosity of a Green Grant and parish funds, we were able to replace about half of the windows. The kitchen and dining room are complete, as well as the entire first floor facing the Common. Just submitted, we are hoping that another Green Grant will fund the completion of this project that will include the entire top floor and the three classrooms on the first floor facing the parking lot. These windows have greatly improved the comfort levels in the rooms, reduced noise from the traffic on South Common Street and are saving the parish money and reducing our carbon footprint by consuming less energy.

Currently, we are in the process of obtaining bids to undergo asbestos abatement in the kitchen and dining room. Though the asbestos is intact, it is no longer code to have asbestos-covered heating pipes in a food preparation area.

Meanwhile, we continue working towards being good stewards of the gifts God has given us.

I came away from the experience thrilled with the whole thing and honored to have had even a small role in its production. There is a lot of faith going around, here at St. Stephen's! So—what do I mean by "extension?"

I'll be wandering around talking to people of the St. Stephen's community, hoping to keep my general focus on grace, in the context of special occasions like the swiftly approaching Mothers' and Fathers' Days. I'd like to continue getting to know you better, especially your thoughts on God's Kingdom.

One more bit of business—an apology. When I spoke with Joanne Benjamin and Joanne Droppers and reported their comments in the last issue, I cleverly mixed up their names!

Feeling foolish about the mixup, I apologized profusely to the two Joannes and they both made me feel perhaps it wasn't quite the end of their worlds. Thank you, both Joannes!

To business (at last). This month we talked with Lucinda McClain, for many years the leader of the Confirmation Class. She remains one of the most beloved members of the St. Stephen's family, a truly remarkable woman. I asked about her Liberian childhood and the part her parents had played in her own upbringing. Almost the first thing she said was a correction of my opening question, in which I said, "I know that your father was a bishop there What was that like?"

"He did not become a bishop, but he came close," she said. "I loved and admired my father, always. He loved music, especially classical. He played the organ in our church, and at home too, since we had a small organ."

He was a patient, kind, gentle man. He had to be patient...I was the only girl of six children. My mother said, 'You are just like your father!'"

"More than anything, I learned how to pray from him. We spent a great deal of time together, just the two of us. He would say 'Go ahead and pray," and I would say, 'Me? I don't know what to say at all!' But then he would show me how to begin and how to speak to God. So I gradually got more comfortable."

Another thing I learned to love from him was music. At Christmas, he and I would always sing "Away in a Manager," just the two of us."

Did you know that he came here to St. Stephen's to preach? While he was here I was doing the Confirmation class, and he helped me develop an outline for the things that were appropriate for children to learn and understand at that age. I used the outline afterwards for just as long as I did the Confirmations—many years."

I know that he shaped me in many ways. To this day, for instance, if I am faced with a situation that I do not understand, I will walk away from it and go off somewhere quiet and pray over it. I won't rush into anything. Also I am careful about what I say to people and just how I say it I still pray all the time. He was very tender toward everyone, and toward me."

CAMP REGISTRATION SUNDAY IS MAY 4! BCH Camp Director Alessia Doss will be with us on Sunday, May 4 to collect all Camp registration forms. Forms are available at church and online. Camp for 4th-10th graders costs \$575 per week; and there are some new 2-week sessions this year. The Camp asks each family to pay what you can BUT scholarships are available. Diocesan scholarships look to the family, the church and the Diocese each paying 1/3 of the cost. This means that the requested minimum family share is \$192. If a family cannot pay the \$192, a letter explaining why needs to accompany the clergy signed camp scholarship form. OASIS AND THE SPOT UPDATE. On Annual Good Friday Teen Brunch welcomed several hundred young people grieving the death of Amoy Blake. St. Stephen's teens and the Youth Ministry Team adjusted to the shift in program and purpose, and met the need. At the end of the morning, teens attached brightly colored zipties to our fence as reminders of the brightness of Amoy's spirit and the need for each person to shine brightly. The teens closed out April with a "Feast of Cultures" Potluck and kick-off of *PROJECT 135* with a screening of "No Place Like Home," a documentary about youth homelessness in Massachusetts. *PROJECT 135* is focused on helping homeless teens in Lynn, which has the highest homeless youth rate in the Commonwealth. Its mission is to support the passage of House Bill 135, An Act Providing Housing and Support Services for Unaccompanied Homeless Youth. Through art and advocacy, our teens will engage *PROJECT 135*.
