One of the things I never experienced before coming to St. Stephen's is talking to movie location scouts. Four different scouts have rung the bell or called, asking if we might be interested in working with them. Two of them have come by in the last week. Nothing much has come of it so far but it might be a source of income as long as it would not be too disruptive. The decision lies with the Wardens and Vestry. The curious thing is that they have not been interested in the sanctuary and the Tiffany windows but in our basement rooms. Those well used, somewhat gritty spaces that are the locus of much of our ministry.

When visitors come to St. Stephen's I enjoy giving a tour of beautiful sanctuary with the windows and amazing architecture. I love to tell the story of the Mudges. The father who was a textile mill owner whose business partners where southern cotton plantations owners and slave holders. The son, who joined the Union Army and died fighting against those same plantation owners.

It is often hard to explain how St. Stephen's is reaching out and connected to this community. I can list the programs but mere words do no justice to the lives changed. It is hard to explain the gratitude of a young mother, who speaks limited English, for her child being in the KIC Afterschool or the family who gets by because of the food pantry. There are signs and wonders occurring in our basement rooms; the Good News of God in Christ is being actualized there all the time.

The movie location scouts do not really care about all of this but their interest in our basement rooms reminds me of the incredible value of the ministry that goes on in those spaces. So, if they want to give us some money to continue this work, as long as their presence does not interfere with our true mission, I say, why not. Then, maybe, when you are watching the next Mark Wahlberg movie, and you see the scene that is supposed to be a prison library, you can say, "I know about the truly miraculous things that happen there."

SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE We recognize St. Stephen's is a diverse congregation that needs a variety of tools to inform the search for a new rector. To this end, the Search Committee decided to use surveys, interviews, and small groups to inform our work. We have worked tirelessly for the last two months to create a survey that would inform how we compile the Parish Profile. The Parish Profile will be uploaded to the website for you and prospective candidates to

view and get a sense of who St. Stephen's has been, is, and hopes to be. Furthermore, the survey contains questions that will help guide us as we seek to interview you and yours. We hope to begin the interviews as early as next week! Small groups should begin after October 7. We hope to finish the Parish Profile in December. After that the Parish Profile must be brought before the congregation, the vestry, and the diocese for response. Once the Profile is established we can begin to think about calling a new rector. At all times, we want your feedback and comments on this process. We exist to serve you. It is our honor. Please hold us in prayer and vigilance. If you have not received a survey and would like one, please see Helen Patmon or Steve Switzer.

THE REV. MARTHA HUBBARD IS APPOINTED REGIONAL CANON

Bishop Alan M. Gates has announced the appointment of the Rev. Martha L. Hubbard to serve as a regional canon in the Merrimack Valley, North Shore, Mystic Valley and Concord River deaneries.

Each of the three regional canons will serve a geographic area of the diocese encompassing four deaneries and will have three primary responsibilities: lay leadership support and development in congregations; transition ministry with congregations and clergy involved in search processes for new ordained leadership; and clergy wellness and family support. The Rev. Martha Hubbard, was the rector of St. Paul's Church in Newburyport since 2017. She brings to her new role 25 years of parish leadership experience and a dedication to education and formation as central to congregational development. She has been the dean of the Merrimack Valley Deanery since 2016 and has been active in deanery leadership as a co-convener of the deanery assembly. She is a founding member of the Lower Merrimack Valley Collaborative of six Episcopal churches seeking congregational vitality and development together. She is also a past president of the Barbara C. Harris Camp and Conference Center Board of Directors and has been a mentor in the Making Excellent Disciples Program.

Martha will be replacing the Rev. Jean Baptiste Ntagengwa as our Diocesan contact during the rector search. Jean Baptiste will be beginning a new position supporting immigrant congregations like our Kenyan congregation.
