And the Word became flesh... and dwelt among us

Most of us think of God becoming incarnate and dwelling among us at Christmas. Yet, I know God was in our midst this summer. I can go back to May, when families gathered for our Community Dinner to prepare and plant our garden. While the garden may be Gospel worthy in its weeds, and its fruitfulness and failure, watching KIC kids and parishioners tend it, harvest from it, and eat its abundance connected us with God's amazing work of creation.

Throughout July, hearing and seeing more than 100 KIC campers plus 21 staff laugh, learn, and play together made Christ-like hospitality alive and real within our walls. Some of the KIC campers were Central American children who had only been in the country for weeks. As issues of children like them detained at the US border received national and local attention, I looked at the rainbow of faces in the KIC community and gave thanks for the radical hospitality of our church. I saw God's kingdom when I watched KIC games on the Common or cooking time or African dance or poetry. KIC's language is smiles and laughter, and all are welcome.

Each week of the summer as we gathered the KIC community, scores of young people from across the Diocese gathered at BCH Camp in New Hampshire. More than 20 St. Stephen's children enjoyed weeks at Camp thanks to the generosity of parish and Diocesan scholarships. One boy, who was not enthusiastic about going to Camp, had to be pried away at the end of his week and declared camp the best experience of his life. He sang songs, told stories, praised the food, and matter of factly declared, "You know, Mom, Jesus was a cool dude." At BCH our kids meet Jesus and learn to love him.

Once camps closed, our teens and young adults were free to go on retreat. A dozen Young Adults spent 3 days exploring what they need to let go or sacrifice and what they need to learn or acquire to reach their dreams. From careening down hills in zorb balls and on tubes to making dream boxes to experiencing deep and silly conversations, YAs "found just what they needed" and "felt free to move forward." Later in August, 11 9th and 10th graders spent 3 days on Martha's Vineyard hosted by Confirmation teacher Danielle Pappas and the MV hostel. As teens pushed beyond the familiar meeting new people, traveling on a ferry, seeing the President's motorcade, swimming in the ocean, and jumping off of bridges, they experienced Christian community and found God. Their last morning, a man staying at the hostel with his wife and young adult daughters pressed cash into my hand telling me to "do something special with the kids." When the group thanked him, he explained that he had grown up in foster care and he knew and wanted them to know that with God's love and guidance they could go anywhere and do anything. In our days away from Lynn in community surrounded by the wonder of God's glorious creation, teens and YAs met God. And when we returned to the church during those first two weeks of August, Climate Bikers slept, talked, painted, and worked for a future in which we all live simpler lives to ensure the future of our world. God surely is dwelling among us.

But, of course, in the midst of youth and life, there is also death. And, in August, we gathered to give thanks for the lives of Bob Pedro and Dorothy Robinson. We celebrated two saints of God who made God's love and justice manifest in our lives, our church, and our community.

As we turn ourselves to September and the "active season" of the church year, may we open our hearts and lives to God living among us here and now forming and transforming us for the good of God's kingdom. Amen. JSG+



Our Togther Now Campaign Dollars At Work

A heartfelt "Thank You!" goes out to all of you who pledged financial support through our partnership with the Diocesan Together Now Campaign. We are pretty much at the half-way point of the five year pledge campaign. Here is a snapshot of how your dollars are making a difference in the life our parish and in our diocese.

The Apse Wall Project: The bulk of your campaign dollars, though paid directly to the diocese, come right back to St. Stephen's. The scaffolding finally came down in December 2013. The project is now complete and the Massachusetts Historical Commission signed off on all the approved exterior restoration. The treasurer's office has been busy making monthly payments on the construction loan to Eastern Bank with your campaign dollars that we receive.

Green Grants: A portion of your campaign dollars go to support diocesan efforts to help parishes become environmentally friendly by awarding Green Grants that will help us reduce our carbon footprint. In 2013 and again in 2014, St. Stephen's was awarded Green Grants totaling \$12,500 to help defray the cost of the replacing the energy inefficient, single-paned, steel casement windows in the Anderson (Sunday School) Wing. The project was just completed in mid-August and now there is better ventilation in the summer months and the cold air and snow can stay outside in the winter months. The only windows not replaced were the stained glass windows at the end of each hallway and the two in the chapel.

Life Together Intern Returns: Another portion of your campaign dollars goes to support the Diocesan Life Together Intern Program. During the academic year 2013-2014 and again for 2014-2015, Daniel Bell will be working with us at St. Stephen's, particularly with our High School youth group, Oasis, with the Young Adult group, with Sunday School and in various other capacities.

Barbara C. Harris Camp and Conference Center: Some of your campaign dollars are supporting the work of "The Camp" strengthening it to serve our diocese. The Camp is now entering its second decade of forming youth from around the diocese. This year, like previous years, many St. Stephen's youth, have benefitted from at least one week of overnight camp.

The Cathedral Church of St. Paul: The cathedral has been closed all summer due to the interior redesign and structural improvements so that our cathedral can continue to be a "House of Prayer for All People" and to better facilitate diocesan programs and worship.

Dear Friends,

I have never been good at taking risks. I prefer to take my time pondering over questions, and thinking things through before making any decisions. Part of it is my personality and part of it is my upbringing. As the oldest child I was always the "responsible" one who acted older than her age. But sometime God calls us to take risks, to take a plunge into the deep. Four years ago God called me to risk my comfortable and predictable life to enter the ordination process for the priesthood. While I'm now almost successfully through the process, those first few months definitely felt like I was jumping into a bottomless well.

Jumping in isn't easy. It requires equal amounts of courage and vulnerability. During a recent trip to Martha's Vineyard some of St. Stephen's youth had the opportunity to learn this lesson by jumping off the bridge at State Beach. The bridge isn't necessarily high but it is famous for being the location of several scenes from the movie "Jaws." When we arrived at the beach the bridge was already crowded with eager children, teens and adults waiting for a turn. Full of excitement our youth ran to the bridge, while Danielle Pappas and I watched from the rock piling. We had the cameras ready for some great action shots, the youth climbed onto the railing, arms out ready to take the plunge...and then just stood there. For the next fifteen minutes the youth took turns standing on the bridge railing and then getting down only to climb back up again. Danielle and I yelled encouragement to them and waited.

Finally one youth took the plunge and then the rest followed. They came up out of the water overflowing with laughter and joy. Talking with them afterwards they all admitted that the waiting to jump was scarier than the actual jump. The longer they waited the more their fear grew. It was a perfect reminder that sometimes you just have to jump in.

As we begin September with all its exciting programs and activities I pray that God will give us the courage to take the plunge.

GRACE NOTES

I'm not the one who should be writing this, but it falls to me because I'm responsible for this column. Many people in our church knew Bob Pedro far better than I did.

When we joined St. Stephen's in the early nineties, Bob, a gruff man who could be a little scary at times (unless you knew him) was serving on the Vestry and taking pictures of church individuals and their families for a church address book that filled the walls with the St. Stephen's family. Bob would look at you and growl "Be There!" in his bass rumble, and if you understood him, you would definitely "Be There!" And nowhere else.

Bob was Junior Warden on the Vestry when I joined it. He didn't say a great deal, but what he said was always intelligent and to the point.

And he generally made his case. Later, he served as one of the legendary Friday Fixers.

Bob had been working at the GE. He had a lot of seniority, but I believe he took an early retirement when it was obvious that big layoffs were ahead. This left him with a house and a steady income, which he managed carefully but worried about it toward the end, when it was not possible to get back into his house after the surgeries that shortened both legs.

He was good with a computer, especially in the design area, and he produced a lot of very good flyers and event announcements for the church, among others, under the banner of The Big Boomer Crab Company (Boomer being another of his nicknames).

He may have seemed like a big crab. He was anything but. He was a smart, shrewd man. His faith was strong and he had a kind heart. When he was with friends, which was often, he talked a great deal about his family. He spent endless amounts of time working with St. Stephen's kids, who knew him universally as "Mr. P." It was in this context that my wife Bonnie, another lover of kids, got to know him well.

Bob's last years were not easy. He had diabetes, a wretched disease that chips away at your body and finally comes to your heart. In Bob's case, he had to go through many years of dialysis and then endure multiple amputations, which left him unable to walk. He was never unable to talk, though, which was a real blessing because he lived to talk with and make connections with people; just about everyone he ever came in contact with remembers the contact very well.

Bonnie told me just now that in restaurants Bob liked to ask the wait staff, "What's your favorite thing to eat here?" And if those who understood him equivocated, or said, for example, "It depends on what you're looking for," he would say, in mock anger, "No, no, I want to know what's *your* favorite thing?"

Or so it seemed. Bonnie summed him up beautifully just now. This is what she said: "He was a big man with a big heart."

When we first came to St. Stephen's, I would pick out people who reminded me of the disciples. For me, Bob was always Peter.

I'm grateful to have known him.

STEWARDS OF RESOURCES

A WORD FROM DIOCESAN INTERN DAN BELL. September marks my first full month back at St. Stephen's after a busy summer away. I spent the majority of my time this summer at the Barbara C. Harris Camp in New Hampshire, where I had the wonderful opportunity to serve as the camp's Faith Formation Director. For five weeks in July and August, I was in charge of running a faith formation program centered on the theme of community. We gathered as a camp every day to worship, read scripture and do fun activities based on each day's Bible passage. Of course, I got to have lots of fun apart from my official job duties as well, doing things like archery, canoeing, swimming, and belting out "Let It Go" from the movie Frozen during a talent show!

Right after camp wrapped up, I headed back to Boston to begin working full-time for Life Together as an Emmaus Fellow (second-year intern). I was part of an amazing staff team that planned and led an eight-day Orientation program for the first-year Micah Fellows. Our time together was transformative and we built a strong foundation for this upcoming year.

I'm excited to be back at St. Stephen's and I'm looking forward to an awesome year of learning and service as Diocesan Intern as I work with the Church School, teen ministries, and the Young Adults Group as well as learning more about liturgy, pastoral care, and parish finances. It will be filled undoubtedly with new joys and challenges, and I'm grateful to have another opportunity to minister with all of you in Christ's Name.

ST.STEPHEN'S VISIBLE IN BISHOP ALAN'S SEPTEMBER 13 CONSECRATION. As the Diocese gathers to witness the consecration of Alan Gates as our Bishop, Zach Zimiroski will present Bp. Alan on behalf of the youth of the Diocese; Kyliah Almeida will carry the St. Stephen's banner recognizing our parish as one in which Alan served (seminarian under the Rev. Bill Lawson in the 1980s); and Chris Trahan, as a member of Diocesan Council, and the clergy will be part of the procession. Tickets will be mailed to the office by September. Please let us know if you can help with rides because we hope to spare the expense of renting a van.

VESTRY SUMMARY. In July the Vestry gathered July 25-26 at the Rector's for community building and strategic planning. At the Friday evening meeting the Vestry reviewed financials; approved Dan Bell's application for Postulancy for the priesthood, and learned that the parish Discernment Committee will continue to work with Hazel Johnson. During the Saturday Planning Retreat, Mission Imperative groups presented "Year 1 Priorities" and the Vestry discussed how new leaders might be raised up as we seek to live into our 2014 Mission Plan. Full implementation plans will be presented September 21. On August 17 the Vestry approved upgrading our computer equipment and software to facilitate operation and increase data security. In addition, the Vestry approved Sarah van Gulden's application for ordination to the Priesthood; we anticipate Sarah's ordination on Saturday, January 10, 2015 at Trinity Church, Boston. KIC Director Audrey Gutfreund and KIC mentor Kyliah Almeida talked about KIC 2014 and showed a KIC slide show; Audrey and Chris Trahan then presented our emerging plan for KIC expansion to a full year program through Diocesan Mission Hub participation. A KIC Advisory Committee will be gathered over the next couple of months as a Mission Hub implementation Plan is drafted. The Vestry received thank you notes from scholarship recipients, and Climate Bikers who stayed in our buildings in August.

TREASURER'S REPORT. September is always a hard month financially because many members let pledge payments slip during the summer, quarterly grants do not arrive until the end of the month, and summer and start-up expenses run high. We can all help by catching up on our pledges now. We all know that catching up in December is hard; please fulfill your pledges now because we count on receiving every dollar pledged.

BIG MONEY RAFFLE SUCCESS. Thanks to all who supported the 7th Annual Big Money Raffle! A great time was had by all at the Big Money Bash at The Porthole Restaurant as we celebrated selling all 200 tickets. Dancing, door prizes, great food, and socializing as well as prize money?! Who could ask for anything more? Thanks to all

the volunteers who made it all possible. The hard work of Heather Collis Puro, Carolyn Hoy, Irene Axelrod and Sally Gosselin resulted in ticket sales happening all over the North Shore and beyond, and brought over 120 guests to the Porthole party. After distributing the prize money of \$7, 500 and other costs, we will have raised almost \$8,000 for St. Stephen's. Nice work! HOSPITALITY TO CHILDREN, YOUTH & YOUNG ADULTS

KIC CONCLUDES FABULOUS SUMMER. Each July, St. Stephen's offers Kids in Community (KIC), a free day camp for Lynn elementary school aged children. This summer's four-week session was one of the best attended yet: KIC registered 120 children and provided summer jobs for 20 teens and young adults, including 5 St. Stephen's youth. The program also engaged 12 adult volunteers, who taught workshops, read to children, or served lunch and breakfast to campers. Kids in Community was made possible this year through financial support from the Sears Family Fund, St. Andrew's Episcopal Church Marblehead, Amelia Peabody Foundation, Old Neighborhood, Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, First Jobs, and the Unitarian Universalist Church of Greater Lynn.

KIC had a wide variety of activities, and most kids found at least one thing they really loved. Children participated in workshops on art, drama, poetry, zumba, and healthy eating with adult specialists. Teen mentors led sports or games outside, as well as taught campers about their own skills and hobbies—among other things, kids this year danced, sang, made puppets, jewelry & sculpture, baked brownies, cared for the vegetable garden (and ate the vegetables!), and wrote their own raps. Finally, the whole camp took one field trip each week, to the Museum of Science, the Boston Children's Museum, the New England Aquarium, and the Peabody Essex Museum.

As fun as the activities are, though, they are not the most important part of KIC. Instead, most campers, staff, and families describe their personal growth and the relationships they formed over the course of KIC. One teen mentor described "the power of being a role model" for kids because "they observe more than I thought they would," and that this had encouraged him to act as the "best person he knew how to be." Another mentor, Michelle, mentioned how great it made her feel when a parent picked her campers up at the end of the day and said that her child "talks about [Michelle] all the time!" and thanked her for the program. Perhaps the best summary came from a camper named Isaac, a second grader. This was Isaac's first summer at KIC, and he started out very unhappy because he thought he was going to sleep-away camp. By the last day, he had come around, as he announced, "I love Miguel (his mentor), I love KIC, and I'm coming back next year, and the year after that, and the year after that!"

HOW IS GOD CALLING YOU TO JOIN OUR MINISTRIES WITH YOUNG PEOPLE? Whenever we baptize, we promise to do everything in our power to support these people in their life in Christ. Our mission imperatives challenge us to show Christ-like hospitality to children, youth, and young adults. Living into these commitments requires that adults teach in our church school, serve as mentors with our middle school and high school young programs, prepare meals for our teen groups, help train acolytes and maintain their robes, drive young people to Diocesan events, volunteer with Kids' Choir, serve on the KIC Advisory Board, and faithfully bring children and youth to our formation ministries. Members of the congregation cannot keep our promises for young people who never show up. And, the church cannot serve those who come faithfully if we don't have enough adults volunteering. This summer Rev. Sarah invited us all to pray about where and how God might be calling us to engage in the life of St. Stephen's and especially in our ministry with young people. Several members have stepped up and are ready to serve but we need more helping hands and hearts as programs kick off in September. Talk to Rev. Sarah today about how and where you might serve.

We invite all children to bring their school backpacks to Church on Sunday, September 7 so that we can bless them and their backpacks as they begin a new year. And, fear not, even if young people forget their backpacks on the 7th, we want all students to come forward for our prayers of blessing at the beginning of the school year.

Registration will be held after church on Sunday, September 7th and Sunday, September 14th. Classes for Nursery through Grade 12 will begin September 21.
