My hope and prayer for each of us this summer is that we will find the time and space to deepen our relationships with God and those we love. As our readings on Trinity Sunday reminded us, God created us to be in relationship with God, creation and each other. Through trips to the mountains, walks on the beach, and time watching vegetables and flowers burst from the earth, may we celebrate the abundance and wonder of God's creation. She will focus particularly on families with children and adults interested in supporting our ministry with young people as she begins to build relationships. But, as Sarah and I went over our July calendar, I started to worry because opportunities and obligations just kept coming. Beyond KIC and our regular weekly worship and study, I talked with her about the Monastery outing on the 1st, the Community Cookout & Common Art on the 13th, the ECCO training retreat on the 18th-19th, the Big Money Raffle all month with the drawing party on the 20th, the Vestry Planning Retreat the 25th-26th, and Teens at the Table on the 27th.

For a moment I worried but then I remembered that we meet each other and God as we gather to eat, to study, to raise money, to make art, to garden, to nurture kids, to organize for justice, and to worship. Day by day the invitation of St. Stephen's through the summer is come into community and meet God in this place. It's easy to become overwhelmed by our smallness in the midst of all that goes on in our lives and world. But, as we gather with family, friends, and church, let's take time this summer to remember and celebrate the greatness of love that binds us together in community.

GREETINGS FROM YOUR NEW ASSISTANT

Dear Friends,

Greetings from your new Urban Assistant! I'm very excited to be joining the St. Stephen's community and serving with you in your varied ministries.

I grew up in Duxbury, Massachusetts attending St. John's Episcopal Church from kindergarten right up through high school. Church was like my second home so I was involved in as many programs as possible: Sunday school, acolytes, youth choir, youth group and vestry. My favorite memories from St. John's are from the annual youth mission trip to the outer banks of South Carolina. For a week we would complete minor repairs on houses for families who couldn't afford the much needed work.

After high school I attended Connecticut College for my undergraduate degree followed by three years at the Episcopal Divinity School for my Master's in Divinity degree. While at EDS I took several classes on church mission, which led me to spend a summer in Jamaica directing weekly church camps for youth. After graduation I was blessed to work with the Reverend John de Beer at St. Mark's in Burlington as their Associate for Multigenerational Ministries. The three years I spent with this community proved to me the importance of creating and building community centered on God's unfailing love.

When I left St. Mark's to move in with my new husband, Derek, I figured I was done with serving the church. I had fallen in love with teaching and was preparing to go back to school to earn my teaching degree. But God had other plans! So I went back to St. Mark's as a parishioner to begin the discernment process for ordination to the priesthood.

It took three wonderful and challenging years and two internships (one at the Leadership Development Initiative and one at Ascension Memorial Church) before I was ordained to the transitional diaconate this past June. As is tradition in this diocese I will serve as a deacon for 7 months before being ordained to the priesthood next January.

Derek and I currently live in Rockport where he serves as Pastor at First Congregation Church. In our spare time we enjoy traveling, gardening, and taking in the beauty of Cape Ann.

I can't wait to start this new adventure with you all and look forward to seeing you on Sunday, July 6! Have a safe and happy Fourth of July!

GRACE NOTES

"What's Driving Miz Debbie?"

I'm sitting with Debbie Potter at a wooden table in her big new kitchen, thankfully drinking a glass of water. I have questions.

"How'd you come to St. Stephen's?"

"I was born here. Baptized. Confirmed. Married. My kids were baptized here. I did Sunday School here. I sang in the choir. I always loved it. St. Stephen's was such a wonderful church. The priest would come have dinner with us. One year I got a wooden doll house. It was huge. I was six. Now I'm ***** but I still want my dollhouse! The neighborhood was so safe. Neighbors watched out for us. In the church we played basketball upstairs, saw movies. We had so much fun, there was so much involvement! It was a good life, that's why I stayed. I got leadership roles and guidance. I grew up feeling secure about myself...started the knitting club...went to New York with Rev. Jane Bearden to protest the war!"

"So that's why you stayed?"

"Yes. People love each other here. It feels safe even today, when not much else feels safe. Now it's scary for kids sitting out in the Commons. Back then there was more parental involvement. Today, parents feel separated from their kids, having to work all the time. The policeman knew your name. We were Little Boston. Everything you did you took pride in—helping others was part of it—in the neighborhoods someone would catch you if you fell. I try to be as active as I can. The other day I counted twenty jobs at the church, lay ministry, healing, funerals, sub-deacon, Oasis, choir, knitting club...you name it, I'm in it," she says, laughing her irrepressible laugh.

"I'm especially interested in how you manage the breakfasts and lunches for Kids in Community. That's something you do for two hours every single weekday! How on earth do you manage that, keeping track of all those meals? How long have you managed that?"

"Except when I was so sick, twelve years."

"Twelve years?! How could you possibly keep doing it so long? And why?"

"Well, the School Department says, we'll give you breakfast and lunch if you administer it. I knew it was a golden opportunity. And I think like a mom, you know. I think about my kid, he comes home, he's well fed, he's happy – 'Oooh, we saw a great big bear today! I wrote a good poem today!' The moms wanted a place where kids could feel safe and there was no pressure about Bible studies. I don't think feeding the kids should be ignored, because when you're hungry, you are truly thankful for being fed. Over time I think the kids do learn something about who they really are. It's that old thing called L-O-V-E.

"After a while the kids know you, they see you in the store they say, 'Oh, there's Miz Debbie.' I get tired. I enjoy a little vacation, too. They're giving me one this year. Two people are coming in to make sure the food is well-managed and the kitchen is neat and clean. And my friends Josie and Helen do all the work. I get to come in once a week and cook with the kids!"

"No thanks required. I know I'm here on earth to brighten somebody's life, make the kids feel at home, because that's just how St. Stephen's always treated me. I might be a little selfish about it, because it brings joy to my heart. It's a wonderful feeling. I try to make the kids know they are loved and this is the life, the meaning of life. No judgment, no comparisons between this kid and that. Not any of that. *Let my attitude determine my altitude*. That's what I say."

STEWARDS OF RESOURCES

VESTRY SUMMARY. Steve Switzer will lead the Vestry Mission Goal Implementation process. Team leaders have been identified for each goal—Stewards of resources, Nurturing the congregation, Hospitality to children, youth & young adults, and Community connections; teams will report on priorities for 2014-15 at the July 26 Vestry planning day. Finances look good; treasurer informed Vestry of Wing Bequest of \$200,000-plus, which the Vestry will determine how to use. Grants: New Urban Assistant Sarah van Gulden will start July 1; Green Grant will help fund replacement of remaining windows in Anderson Building; prospects look good for KIC grants as well as Diocesan Closed Church Monies for building work. St. Stephen's continues to work with NS Mission Hub group. KIC under the leadership of Audrey Gutfreund ready for July with 3 assistants, 20 teen mentors, and more campers every day. Approved masonry repair work on Anderson Building stairs & handicapped entrance. Voted to recommend Patrick Lafortune as a Candidate for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Massachusetts.

TREASURER'S REPORT. There is no rest for the Treasurer's office this summer, as hiring dozens of KIC staffers means more paperwork and more payroll processing for Ruthanne and myself. It is wonderful to have to the building buzzing with all the campers and counselors, so it is a welcome task! Please keep your pledge current this summer, even if your summer journeys find you away on the weekends. We have a ton of activity in the building during the summer, so we could use everyone's support to keep on track with our bills. Statements for the first half of the year will come out during the summer so that you can know where you stand with your pledge; please let us know if there are any questions about your pledge statement or if you would like to adjust your pledge up or down. Dan is working as Chaplain at BCH Camp this summer and will be back with us next year. Hazel is Education Director at the Dorchester Boys & Girls Club; she will be our preacher on July 27. HOSPITALITY TO CHILDREN, YOUTH & YOUNG ADULTS

Project Bill 135

Teens create a house on the Common to raise community awareness about the plight of homeless teens and to encourage advocacy for House Bill 135, which would provide transitional housing and support services for homeless teens.



YOUNG ADULTS CONTINUE TO ORGANIZE. In June, YAs made a difference gathering signatures to increase the minimum wage and get earned sick time on the November 2014 ballot, and supported teens in creating our Art Installation to raise awareness about youth homelessness. **The next YA Dinner is Tuesday, July 8th, at 6:30pm.** In early August, we will host a **YA Retreat** to explore the world as it is and the world we want to create. All 18-25 year olds are encouraged to come to the July 8th dinner to learn more about the retreat and get involved in planning and fundraising for the retreat.

TEENS GATHERING FOR FUN & SERVICE. In early June, teens spent a Saturday picking up trash in the neighborhood. In mid-June a mixed group of teens, YAs and younger siblings gathered to implement Oasis' Project 135 Art Installation to draw attention to the issue of teen homelessness and to encourage people to call our legislators to ask them to vote Yes on House Bill 135, which provides transitional housing and services for homeless teens.

Sarah from 1:00 to 4:00. We're also still working out the logistics of a Confirmation Class expedition to Martha's Vineyard in August hosted by Confirmation Class leader Danielle Pappas who is working at the youth hostel on the island for the summer. And, young people in 6th-12th grades are encouraged to consider becoming acolytes! Acolyte trainings will beheld this summer and in the fall.

SUPPORT ABRAHAM AND THE YLA. The Youth Leadership Academy is a Diocesan program that provides 9th & 10th graders a chance to have a great time learning more about Christ and themselves. In August YLA has a mission trip to El Salvador. This trip is designed to build relationships and learn about daily lives of Salvadorans. I have learned from peers who have participated in YLA that the trip will change your outlook on life in a positive way and bring you closer to Christ, which happens to be the reason I joined YLA in the first place. I felt as if I was drifting away from Christ and I knew I had to do something about that. Already in YLA I feel that I have come closer to Christ, which is a major issue and I was reassured that I am proud to be a Christian. During the first YLA meeting I met cool and kind kids who are Christians like me! They encourage me even outside of YLA gatherings. In El Salvador there will be teens who love God also. With the trip in El Salvador each YLAer must raise \$2,100, which was quite overwhelming, but I have faith that I can raise it with help from our church.
