Pure and holy, tried and true
With thanksgiving, I'll be a living

### Dear Friends,

The first time I heard the song, "Sanctuary" I was a first-year student at the Episcopal Divinity School. I was in the EDS chapel for the weekly community Eucharist watching as the presider set the table for communion. This chapel, indeed the entire campus, would be my sanctuary for the next three years. EDS was the first place where I could be my full self—a young woman searching for her part in achieving God's dream. My sanctuary, my holy place, was in the chapel, the classroom, the dining hall, and the tiny dorm room that only had enough space for my bed and dresser.

We tend to think of sanctuary as a place that has no tension or conflict. It is where we find refuge and comfort from fear and stress. In reality a sanctuary is never this perfect, idyllic place. EDS, a sanctuary for students, staff and faculty was full of tension and conflict: the organist didn't know how to properly accompany the African American spirituals, the commuter students didn't feel included in the community, the faculty wanted high salaries, the staff felt under-appreciated, the worship wasn't "Episcopal" enough, etc... As a community we worked together to address these conflicts but they were never fully resolved. Still the EDS sanctuary was strong enough to hold tension and conflicts while providing a place of refuge and comfort.

At St. Stephen's we also strive to be a sanctuary or in the words of the prophet Isaiah: "for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples" (Isaiah 56:7). At the June Vestry meeting members reported the responses they heard to the sermon conversations about sanctuary. A common theme was anxiety, especially about what open sanctuary might mean for the children and youth in our building during the week and on Sunday mornings. The Vestry affirmed that God calls us to be a sanctuary for all and sometimes that requires setting up boundaries. All are indeed welcome except when a person's behavior threatens the safety our sanctuary.

Like EDS, we have created a strong sanctuary that protects children youth and adults who worship on Sundays, attend KIC programs, pick up food from the Food Pantry and come to learn about God. As we welcome the new Latino ministry our sanctuary will extend to include a new community with its own gifts and needs. It may cause conflicts and tension but this will only bring us closer to Isaiah's dream of a house of prayer for all peoples.

Some of the youngest ones will stay for the Summer Learning Program, where they will work on increasing their skills in reading, writing, and math. Healing Services on Thursday afternoon will continue, followed by Tea and Talk. The Food Pantry will be open on Friday afternoons, except for the first Friday of the month.

The vestry will have its retreat at Adelynrood Retreat and Conference Center on July 21-22 and the teenagers will be going on a mission trip to Southwestern Virginia in August. Although these events will not take place at St. Stephen's, the church and its mission will be on the minds and in the hearts of all those participating. And of course, the Big Money Raffle party will happen at the Porthole Pub at 5:00PM on July 23. This half page of activities is typical of our church and I have probably missed listing some. Summer is most definitely not a time of rest at our church!

But I hope that each of us does find some quiet time whether it is in church or outside, to enjoy the time we have been given, to renew that faith that is a gift to us from God. If you can, I hope that you will participate in one or more of the activities listed here, and that you will enjoy being with your St. Stephen's family.

### STEWARDS OF RESOURCES

VESTRY SUMMARY: JUNE 25. The Vestry shared responses they heard while facilitating sermon conversation groups on the topic of sanctuary. Members reported concerns about the tension of holding open sanctuary when children are present in the building. The clergy and wardens assured the Vestry that safety is always the top priority. After a report from Kevin Neil and his Discernment Committee the Vestry voted unanimously to approve his application to become a postulant to the priesthood. Kevin will submit his application, with the Vestry's endorsement, to the Diocese in mid August. Michael Brown and Rev. Sarah gave reports about summer youth programs. Work continues on the north side of the Anderson Building that was damaged after a pipe burst from the cold temperatures. All of the asbestos and debris was cleared out and the contractor's team is working around the clock to complete repairs before July 10.

TREASURER'S REPORT. Pledge statements will come out in early July for the second quarter; if you have any questions, email or call the parish office and someone will get back to you. Don't forget to keep your donations current over the summer because our expenses don't go on vacation. Summer work for the Treasurer's office includes tracking and paying the KIC staff, bringing financial audits up-to-date and into compliance with DioMass, continuing Realm date base implementation, and some basic cleaning out of the office. Summer brings many opportunities to support the general health of the budget through the Big Money Raffle - so buy and sell tickets so that we keep our programs running in the black.

**STAFF UPDATES.** On June 4, we bid Godspeed to our sexton Mark Gendreau as he accepted fulltime employment as a driver for GLSS. For the last several years, Mark has blessed St. Stephen's with his hard work and positive attitude. Always, he has done all that we ask plus a little bit more. We are working to fill the sexton position before KIC Camp starts on July 10. On the KIC front, KIC Director Audrey Gutfreund won't be with us for KIC Camp this summer but former KIC Camp Director James Liberge will join the team for July and August. We are excited to have James back as well as 3 talented and experienced Program Assistants—Asdrubal, Darnesha, and Derek. And, we look forward to Audrey's return for KIC Music in September.

**PEOPLE IN THE ORDINATION PROCESS.** Currently, St. Stephen's has several people in the Diocese of Massachusetts ordination process. Patrick LaFortune graduated from Gordon-Conwell in May and was ordained to the transitional deaconate on June 3. Patrick is serving as our deacon in June and will preach for us on July 9; in the months ahead, he hopes to begin a part-time curate position in the Diocese. **Dan Bell** also was ordained at the Cathedral on June 3. He continues to serve as Protestant Chaplain at Tufts University, which he hopes to combine with a part-time parish position. Dan will be with us as our Deacon and preacher on July 16. Hazel Johnson is a Postulant (soon to apply for candidacy) for the priesthood and has finished her first year at BU School of Theology. In the fall, field education will take her to the chaplaincy at Brandeis University and the Agape Community Church in Waltham. She will be with us as our preacher on August 27. **Kevin Neil** worked with our parish Discernment Committee this Spring; on June 25, our Vestry voted to recommend his application for Postulancy to the priesthood. Kevin is spending the summer working in the L'Arche Community in Chicago and will be a Boston-based Life Together Fellow this fall. He will be our preacher on August 13. We also have a couple of people contemplating how God is calling them and considering whether to attend the Diocesan Discernment Day in February. Please keep all those responding to calls to ordained ministry in your prayers.
